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ABOUT US

The parent organization, "National Association for the Blind" (India), was founded in Mumbai in 1952 and is the country's largest organization serving the blind. The NAB's Delhi State Branch was established in 1979 in New Delhi's R K Puram. The National Association for the Blind, Delhi, is a non-profit organization registered under the Societies Registration Act of 1860 on April 19, 1979, and has operated out of its current location in R K Puram since 1986. The founding president and honorary general secretary of the company were the late Mr. Jagdish Kapur and the late Mrs. Vidya Batra.

NAB Delhi has been serving children and adults with visual impairments for the past 43 years now. It has organized a variety of programs for children with visual impairments and additional disabilities. The branch began with a humble start in 1986 with primary level education, a hostel, and an administration/finance section. 110 people make up NAB Delhi's team at the moment, and they are all dedicated to the cause we support. NAB Delhi's main goal is to enable visually impaired children to live self-sufficient, dignified, and independent lives.

'Tamaso Ma Jyotirgamaya' (Lead us from Darkness to Light) is the guiding principle that has never been forgotten and has become an omnipresent philosophy on which all of NAB's facilities and strategies are formulated. Our Motto is 'GROWTH WITH DIGNITY' – A Vision for Visually Impaired.

Pre-Integration Unit

Pre-Integration or Preparatory Unit provides the basic foundation skills to children between the ages of 5 and 9 for their eventual integration into mainstream schools.

Integrated Education Unit

Young visually impaired students are admitted to mainstream schools once they learn to read and write.

Centre for Multiple Disabilities

Centre for Multiple Disabilities provides intervention services for visually impaired children with additional disabilities and deafblind children since 1994.

Technology Training Centre

NAB Delhi is the most sought-after centre providing computer training and assistive technology training to blind persons of all age groups.

Braille And Large Print Unit

The Braille printing unit of NAB Delhi was established in 1995. It provides books in all formats including Braille, Large Print, Audio or eBook.

Transport Facilities

NAB Delhi provides transport facilities to all the 160+ blind children living in the hostel.

Hostel Facilities

NAB Delhi has a hostel which accommodates 160+ blind children belonging to poor families hailing mostly from rural India.

Digital Library

NAB Delhi maintains a digital library catering to the needs of the visually impaired on an all-India basis. We have one of the biggest collections of books in DAISY Talking book and eBook format.

KEY ACTIVITIES DURING 2021 – 2022

Assistance to students and their families during the Pandemic

- NAB Delhi and NCPDEP collaborated to provide support vaccination to persons with disabilities and their caregivers for COVID-19 vaccination. This effort was a part of Mission Corona Vijay launched by AIF (American India Foundation) to provide priority vaccination for a million vulnerable and marginalized Indians. This included mobilizing candidates, registering them on the COWIN App, taking slots of inaccessible centers, and providing them home-to-home transport for vaccination in 5 cities – Delhi NCR, Mumbai, Pune, Hyderabad, and Bengaluru.
- Laptops were distributed to students from Classes VI to VIII and e-book readers were distributed to students of Classes IV and V.



- Smartphones were arranged for students so that they could join online classes from home
- Dry ration distribution, along with masks and sanitizers was done for the needy students and their families in NCR and other locations as well.
- Tactile diagram books and Braille books were sent to students' homes.
- Tactile geometry kit for construction and Geometry books for students of two levels – first level for students from Classes I to VI and second level for students from Classes VII to X - were given to the students on 11th February 2022. Required training was also given to Mathematics teachers and students.

PREPARATORY UNIT



Pre-Integration or Preparatory Unit provides the basic foundation skills to children between the ages of 5 and 9 for their eventual integration into mainstream schools. Students in the age group of 4 to 7 years are admitted to the Preparatory Unit and are prepared for admission in mainstream schools in either Class I or II. The children are trained not only in

academics but also in minute aspects of life, which eventually promote independent living. The children are given sensory training, training in daily living skills, pre-braille skills leading to reading and writing braille, large print for low vision students, mathematics with the help of Taylor Frame, Abacus, and Orientation and Mobility within the school independently, and outdoor mobility to give outdoor exposure.

- With the experience gained in the last session with respect to conducting online classes and providing students with the required resources, the teachers and students, and their families were well prepared for attending online classes and evaluation, hence everything ran smoothly. The mainstream school teachers, the resource teachers, and the parents/caregivers worked together towards the education of visually impaired children away from schools for more than a year. Arrangements were made for delivering the Braille textbooks and tactile diagram books to the students' homes well on time.
- In the year 2021-22, there have been 25 new admissions in mainstream schools.
- The newly admitted young students are incorporated into the system and are taken care of. It was quite challenging to teach young visually impaired children to settle down under inclusive education. They took their time settling down with two sets of

teachers. Textbooks and tactile diagram books were provided to the newly admitted students as well.

- The importance of the role of parents and caregivers is appreciated, and we have been training and engaging them in their children's educational activities.

Integrated School Education

NAB runs a Resource Centre. Tactile teaching aids are provided to schools for mainstream school teachers to teach various concepts. There is a team of 25 teachers, which includes special educators, computer trainers, a music teacher, a Home Science Teacher and a mobility instructor. Classes are conducted every day from 2:30 pm to 6:30 pm.

The Centre's main objective is to help the students with their class work, homework and revisions. We have highly qualified special educators. The students from Class III onwards are trained to work on a computer with screen reading software, and when their training is complete, they are provided with laptops, which they use for reading and writing. Gradually the students start appearing for class tests, and unit tests using computers, and finally, appear for their examinations using computers.

At present, the students of Tagore International School, DAV Public Schools and Salwan Public School are appearing for their examinations using computers. The students are provided with textbooks in an accessible format – Braille, large print and text. Audiobooks are also provided to the students. It is with the continuous and exemplary efforts of the Centre that our students performed well in their board exams. The students have secured admission to reputed Universities.

During this year we received the support of Azim Premji Philanthropic Initiative (APPI) for the organization as a whole and education activities in particular. We are extremely thankful to APPI for committing support for 3 years. APPI's support will allow us to sustain critical activities for children with disabilities.

CENTRE FOR MULTIPLE DISABILITIES

Centre for Multiple Disabilities provides intervention services for visually impaired children with additional disabilities and deafblind children since 1994. An individualised educational plan is prepared for each child after a detailed assessment. The goals selected to cover

different areas are commensurate with the child's level. The children are taught various concepts as far as possible through real-life experiences.



This year the Centre for multiple Disabilities focused on the following aspects:

- Working towards skills of some of the children so that move a step closer to the process of inclusion into mainstream schools
- Empowering parents through sharing information on crucial aspects of child's intervention plan
- Conducting network meeting of parents to sensitise them on the importance of UDID card and steps involved in applying online through the <https://www.swavlambancard.gov.in/> portal.
- Conducting workshops on the therapeutic needs of children in virtual mode

- Providing parents and teachers with the opportunity to train in sign language for beneficiaries whose primary mode of communication is sign language.
- Conducting individual meetings with parents to discuss the fallout of COVID-19, prolonged absence from a school set-up, lack of social interaction and the cumulative impact on the children/young adult's behaviour.
- Providing intervention through physical means whenever possible and simultaneously continuing with training via virtual mode.
- Working on vocational products and marketing of the products, thus giving the skills which provide economic empowerment to young adults with multiple disabilities.

IMPLEMENTATION OF INDIVIDUALISED EDUCATIONAL PLAN

The special educators, physical activity instructors as well as music teachers has been engaged in online intervention alongside physical intervention whenever possible. The beneficiaries have been reached through video calls, google meet as well as zoom, or whichever media the parent has been comfortable with.



THERAPEUTIC ASSESSMENT AND RECOMMENDATION OF CHILDREN WITH MULTIPLE DISABILITIES:-

The assessment of children is the most crucial part of any intervention and development of an individual plan. The assessment leads to the establishment of the present level of functioning and thus forms the basis for future goals to be ascertained.

PARENT EMPOWERMENT AND INTERACTION

Two days workshop on speech and Language Development was conducted for 2 groups of parents on the 3rd and 5th of August 2021 by the speech therapist Mr Jitender Kumar. The workshop dealt with language development and a Practical demonstration of activities for encouraging speech was done. The activities discussed were as follows:-

- Take the child's hand and make him/her feel your face (different articulator)
- Blowing exercises: blowing bits of paper, thermocol balls, cotton balls, blowing balloon and whistle

- Showing different tongue movements to the child through tactile experiences
- Using different eatables such as jam, honey for promoting tongue movement
- Sucking exercises: giving something of child's interest on the upper lip to suck it in, using sipper/tumbler, frooti, ice lollies
- Chewing exercises: Sticking eclairs or chips on the palate of the child and do jaw movement, massaging on the cheeks, pocket feeding
- Exercises for releasing tightness in the jaw.

On 24th December 2021, a workshop on Sensory Integration was conducted for parents by Rehabilitation Therapist Ms Khair. The workshop was conducted on Zoom and was attended by 31 parents (8/23 M/F). The training program had the objective to familiarize the parents with sensory processing disorders and the exercises and activities to help overcome sensory issues. The workshop also intended to activate the parents to identify the sensory issues their children have as well as to train them with some tools in tackling these issues. Details of the activities addressing various sensory issues were discussed and queries were answered. The parents were happy to learn simple activities which could solve the sensory needs of their children.

A parent meeting was organized on Zoom on 27th December 2021 to discuss the issue of the UDID cards for the beneficiaries. It was attended by 37 parents. To sensitise the parents as to how to apply online, important points to consider while applying and when actual physical verification will be required were addressed by Mr Vikas of the Social Welfare Department of the Delhi Government. There were queries raised by parents, and detailed written representation would be shared and Mr Vikas has assured that he would try and resolve the issue.

A Regional Network meeting for parents was organised from 19th to 21st January 2022. There were 18 parents who attended the Meeting (4/14 M/F breakup).

It was focused on the following:

- Importance of Technology: interactive and demonstrative session on how a person with visual impairment with additional disabilities can use a smartphone to make their

life easier was conducted. Use of different Apps in it with the help of TALKBACK facilities and refreshable Braille was discussed

- Importance of sign language,
- Importance of vocational rehabilitation and practical demonstrations of different activities such as macrame work, pom-pom making, key chain making, pot holders using rope was done.
- Workshop on Sensory Integration conducted by Therapist on Zoom for the parents.

CO-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

- Independence day celebration was held on 15th August 2021 via zoom, where parents, children and teachers participated in the program
- Christmas celebration was done offline with a few children present at the centre on 23rd December 2021.
- Celebration of Republic day was done again on zoom on 25th January 2022 in which the children presented a cultural program and was attended by teachers, parents and children
- Holi celebration was again done in physical mode with the children present at the centre on

TRAINING AND SENSITISATION OF NGOS

- On 9th July 2021 lecture on definition, identification, screening of children with Multiple Disabilities was conducted for B.ed students of Blind Relief Association Delhi by training coordinator Ms Poonam, there were a total of 24 students with 4/20 M/F break up.
- A 3 day workshop exclusively for sign language was conducted for the CBR workers of NGO Jan Vikas Samiti from 3rd to 5th August 2021. The sessions were conducted by Mr. Anurag Tiwari. There were a total of 14 participants with a 3/11 M/F break up

- On 16th September 2021 lecture on deafblindness, introduction and types was conducted for the Diploma students (Intellectual Disabilities) of Okhla Centre by Ms Poonam – Training Coordinator. There were a total of 24 students 6/18 M/F breakup.
- On 22nd September 2021 lecture was conducted on the same topic of Diploma Students (ASD) of Okhla Centre by Ms Poonam. There were a total of 24 students (8/16 M/F breakup).
- A session on Teaching Learning material for deafblind children was conducted on 29th September 2021 by Mrs. Nandita Saran. The session was a part of the 3-month Web ed on deafblindness being conducted by Sense India
- A CSO meeting for partner organisation and Media sensitization at the regional level was organised on 24th February 2022. Different CSO from the region (Himachal, Rajasthan, Delhi, Uttarakhand) attended it where they discussed the effect of the pandemic and what measures had been taken up by them to overcome it. The total no of participants was 60 with 25/35 M/F.
- Regional Network Meet for partner organisations from the state of Rajasthan, Uttarakhand, Himachal Pradesh, Haryana and Delhi was conducted from 19th to 21st January 2022, where the educators of the respective organisations participated.
- Classes on Deafblindness and Visual Impairment were conducted by Mrs. Poonam on 16th, 21st, 28th and 31st March 2022 for the B.Ed and D.ed students at Action for Autism. There were a total of 48 students (12/36 M/F break up)
- 4 days of basic Indian Sign Language training for the field workers/Anganwadi workers was organised by Jan Vikas Samiti at Varanasi for their workers as well as partner organisations from the state of Jharkhand, Bihar, West Bengal, Madhya Pradesh and Uttar Pradesh. The training was conducted by senior educator Mr. Anurag Tiwari in two batches on 9th - 10th March and 12th -13th March 2022. There were a total of 37 participants (24/13 M/F break up).

TECHNOLOGY TRAINING UNIT

NAB Delhi has been running the Technology Training Programme for more than 20 years. A computer is an excellent tool for blind individuals. It enables them to access information in the same way as non-disabled. This has had revolutionary changes like disciplines of education for blind persons and increased employability and social responsibility.

- This year we started a new course, i.e., Customer Service Executive with the support of SBI Card. 100 visually impaired youths were trained and more than 50% placement was achieved despite Covid related challenges in the employment market.
- With the support of PNB Housing 250 visually impaired were given laptops, smart phones, eBook Readers and Orbit Braille Readers with usage training.
- We have conducted numerous workshops on Technology training, cybersecurity, assistive technology devices and aids, etc.

HELPLINE FOR THE VISUALLY IMPAIRED

NAB Delhi has been operating the Assistive Technology Helpline Service for the visually impaired since September 2006 with the support of the HPS Social Welfare Foundation now called the "Essel Social Welfare Foundation". The beneficiaries of the project include blind persons, persons with low vision, parents/family/friends of visually impaired persons, employers of visually impaired persons, schools & colleges that have enrolled visually impaired students, and organisations working with/for visually impaired persons.

The Helpline service works passionately to keep the visually impaired updated with the latest technology available in the market. It continues to collect and distribute information useful for the visually impaired through different communication channels.

Social networking services are used very actively by the team to help spread information to more visually impaired individuals.

RAM NATH TALKING BOOK LIBRARY (DIGITAL LIBRARY)

National Association for the Blind has a well-established and reputed Audio Book Production facility. This library project is being supported by Spirotech. Under this project,

books required by blind persons are converted to audio and eBook formats and distributed to them free of cost. The books created year after year are compiled at a central location for easy access to all the blind in the country.
